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II. Course Description:

This course is an introduction to the general phenomena of social deviance with primary emphasis given to non-criminal deviance and victimless crimes, including mental disorders, drug use, prostitution, sexual deviance, and pornography. The course is cross listed with SOC 320.

III. Course Objectives:

The objectives of this course are as follows:

- 1. Discuss the relativity of the concept of deviance and deviant behavior.
- 2. Discuss the leading theories (explanations) of deviance and deviant behavior.
- 3. Discuss various forms of deviance.
- 4. Discuss the consequences of a deviant label.

IV. Student Learning Outcomes:

By the end of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Outline the differences between deviance and crime.
- 2. Identify and summarize the leading philosophical explanations of deviance and deviant behavior.
- 3. Enumerate the consequences of a deviant label.
- 4. Identify the factors that contribute to deviance and crime in a society.

V. Required Textbook: Deviant Behavior Alex Thio, Jim Taylor, and Martin Schwartz. Deviant Behavior. (12th edition) 2019. Pearson. (ISBN: 9780134627090).

VI. Methods of Evaluation: Students will be evaluated using the following instruments:

a. EXAMINATIONS:

There will be two examinations (a mid-term and a final) in this course. The mid-term test will comprise of questions drawn from chapters one through seven which make the following presentations: Chapter 1. What is Deviant Behavior? Chapter 2. Positivist Theories of Deviance and Deviant Behavior; Chapter 3. Constructionist Theories of Deviance and Deviant Behavior; Chapter 4. Physical Violence; Chapter 5. Sexual Assault and Child Molestation; Chapter 6. Family Violence; and Chapter 7. Suicide and Self-Harm.

The second test will be made up of questions drawn from chapters eight through fifteen which deal with: Chapter 8. Mental Disorders; Chapter 9. Heterosexual Deviance; Chapter 10. Gays and Other Targets of Stigma; Chapter 11. Internet Deviance; Chapter 12. Drug Use and Abuse; Chapter 13. Drinking and Alcoholism; Chapter 14. Privileged Deviance; and Chapter 15. Under-privileged Deviance.

Each test will be time-sensitive. Once posted, students will have a specific time frame to access and complete the test. During this period, students

will have multiple access to the document. Students must ensure that they save their work after each attempt before logging off. Once the allotted time expires, access to the document will be denied.

An announcement will be posted on the course home page to alert students about each test and/or other course requirements. A message about each test will also be sent to students via the ace-e-mail. There will be no make-up examinations and there will be no extension of the due dates.

b. On-Line DISCUSSIONS:

There is no term paper required in this class. But, there will be 4 discussion questions drawn from the substantive areas of the course for a total of 100 points (25 points each). Once posted, each student will post a detailed original response to the issues raised and then react to the postings of **at least two other students** via the discussion feature of blackboard. That is, each student will have a minimum of three postings for each discussion question (an original response, and at least two reactionary postings to what other students posted).

Note also that the original response and the two or more reactionary postings will have different due dates. That is, the original response will have one due date and the reactionary postings will have a different due date. To be considered for full credit, students must post their original response within the time allowed. Original postings made after such date will be counted as late and late submissions of original entries will have points deducted.

Further, note that students must post an original response before they can see what other students posted. Once the allotted time for the discussion expires, access will be denied. Points are assigned relative to both the quantity and quality of information contained in each post. That is, the more substantive, detailed, and comprehensive each posting is, the more

points the student will receive. Check "Sample Assignment/Discussion" on the course home page. THERE WILL BE NO MAKE-UP DISCUSSIONS.

c. ASSIGNMENTS:

Students will also be required to respond to **Four (4)** questions drawn from specific issues covered in the text and/or in the notes posted on blackboard. Once posted, students will have limited time to respond to the issue(s) via the assignment feature of blackboard. Note that each assignment is worth 25 points. If no response is posted within the allotted time, access to the assignment will be denied. I suggest that you write out your response in word, read through it to ensure that you have responded to ALL parts of the question(s), that you provided the required number of responses, and that you did so in enough details before uploading your response to blackboard. You will not be able to access your entry after it has been uploaded. Ask questions when in doubt. **THERE WILL BE NO MAKE-UP ASSIGNMENTS.**

VIII. Students with Federal Loans and/or Grants:
