COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course addresses theory and application of effective teaching practices in integrating the arts into curriculum as well as objective ways to assess student artwork and performance. The course is considered web-enhanced as, 50 percent or less of course time, students will be engaged in discussion, assignments or activities via the Web. Students will meet face-to-face on the NTCC Campus on Oct. 1, Nov. 5 and Dec. 3 (9a.m. to 4 p.m.). For the purposes of this course, "arts" refers to visual arts, musical arts and creative dramatics.

Course/Graduate Level Rationale:

In 2007, a report issued by the National Center on Education and the Economy titled *Tough Choices or Tough Times* states, "This is a world in which a very high level of preparation in reading, writing, speaking, mathematics, science, literature, history, and the arts will be an indispensable foundation for everything that comes after for most members of the workforce." This course will equip classroom teachers with the knowledge and skills necessary to effectively integrate the arts into their core curriculum including: language arts, math, social studies and science. As a graduate level course, students learn theory and concepts related the field of Creativity, specific artistic disciplines and arts-integration. Students will then learn how to apply theory and concepts to develop and support lesson plans and assessment in the content areas.

Course Objectives:

The course objectives have the following components: 1) Content Objectives, 2) Research Objectives and 3) Professional/Ethical Objectives.

1) Content Objectives

Course instruction, activities/assignments and evaluation are aligned to Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills as related to the TEKS objectives taught in the classroom by each course participant. In addition, course instruction, activities/assignments and evaluation are aligned to the following State Board of Educator Preparation Proficiencies in Fine Arts (K-12):

- Growth as a reflective teaching practitioner
- Understanding of basic research principles and procedures
- Understanding and presentation of peer-reviewed articles

3) Professional/Ethical Objectives

- Appropriate attendance and promptness
- Ability to meet deadlines
- Positive, open attitude towards learning
- Ability to work collaboratively
- Growth as a teacher leader
- Evidence of professional and ethical behaviors during coursework
- Ability to advance the intellectual and ethical foundation of the learning community (our online class)

Course Evaluation:
